## Slaughter Regains Double Digit Lead Over Brooks

# Viewed More Favorably, Slaughter Opens 10-Point Lead Obama Continues to Run Strongly Ahead of Romney

**Loudonville, NY.** Democratic Congresswoman Louise Slaughter has regained a double digit lead over her Republican challenger, Monroe County Executive Maggie Brooks. Slaughter has the support of 52 percent of likely voters (up from 49 percent on October 14<sup>th</sup>) compared to 42 percent for Brooks (down from 44 percent), according to a new Siena College Research Institute poll of likely 25<sup>th</sup> C.D. voters released today.

"While the race tightened a little in the first half of October and Slaughter saw her lead drop from 10 points to five points, over the last two weeks Slaughter has regained the momentum and has extended her lead over Brooks back to 10 points," said Siena College pollster Steven Greenberg. "Although Brooks maintains the support of approximately three-quarters of Republicans and continues to have a small lead among independents, Slaughter is crushing Brooks among Democrats – who have a nine-point enrollment edge – by a whopping 86-12 percent margin.

"Slaughter benefits from a significant gender gap, with women strongly favoring her, 55-38 percent, while men are closely divided, siding with Slaughter by a 48-46 percent margin," Greenberg said.

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"Although only about one-third of the voters are currently represented by Slaughter, she has a commanding 66-28 percent lead with them, more than enough to offset Brooks' slight three-point lead among voters currently

represented by other members of Congress," Greenberg said.

"Slaughter continues to have a strong positive favorability rating, largely unchanged over the last five weeks of a bruising campaign," Greenberg said. "Brooks' favorability rating has dropped moderately, from a nine-point positive rating to a one-point negative rating."

#### Obama Continues to Maintain a Double Digit Lead Over Romney

"President Obama has a 13-point lead, 53-40 percent, over Mitt Romney, maintaining virtually the exact same lead he had two weeks ago and five weeks ago," Greenberg said. "There remains a significant gender gap in the presidential race with men virtually evenly divided and women favoring Obama by 23 points. Obama has a 15-point positive favorability rating and Romney has a nine-point negative favorability rating."

"As Monroe County voters continue to get inundated by commercials and mail in this campaign – as well as others – the race today, just days before voters go to the polls, is in the exact same place it was five weeks ago," Greenberg said. "In a generic re-elect question, half of the voters are prepared to re-elect Slaughter. She continues to be viewed more favorably than Brooks by voters. And she is back to having a double digit lead. With 97 percent of committed voters saying they are absolutely or fairly certain to stick with their current choice and only five percent of voters still undecided, Brooks clearly has a difficult job and little time in which to get it done."

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
